The Antiochian Women has been an organized group of ladies serving Christ through serving others for 50 years. Countless lives have been touched and helped by the acts of mercy that our women perform daily in the parishes around our diocese. Each parish is encouraged to have a local chapter of ladies that serves their community and grows together in Christ. Each March we recognize the women of our parishes by celebrating Women's Month. You know as well as I do that our women are serving continually throughout our year, but thanks to Met. Philip of thrice blessed memory who instituted Women's Month many years ago, we stop each year and take a moment to thank these women and appreciate the sacrifices they make and the efforts they give to our parishes, communities, and diocese.

This year our women will raise money to be sent to the relief effort in Turkey and Syria through our Metropolitan's appeal. Please consider giving to this worthy cause and assisting our Antiochian Women in raising \$200,000 so that we can be matched by an anonymous donor with an extra \$100,000. This is a large goal, but as usual our women are up to the task.

On April 1, 2023, our ladies will participate in our second annual Zoom Hub Spoke Lenten Retreat. A silver lining to the pandemic lockdowns has been our new ability to connect around the diocese using our DOMSE Zoom account. We are blessed to be able to offer this to our ladies during this busy Lenten season.

Our ladies are currently reading "Welcoming Gifts: Sacrifice in the Bible and Christian Life" by Fr. Jeremy Davis and our parish chapters are joining this year to make a common act of mercy by supporting local crisis pregnancy centers. The women of our diocese also keep an updated list of parishioners who are not able to attend church with our FIN (Friends in Need) List. 
ANTIOCHIAN WOMEN OF DOMSE

As you prepare to enter college this fall, don't forget that the DOMSE Scholarship application period is June 1 to July 1, 2023! We hope you plan to submit your application.

We touched base with one of our past DOMSE scholarship recipients, William Neaime, and asked him a few questions and for advice to our-soon-to-be highschool graduates!

Q: What is something you want to share about college with other soon-to-graduate high school students that you wish someone had shared with you about college?

College is often romanticized in media and television as some awesome growth and exploration experience. And while I learned a ton in college, it is important to go in with realistic expectations and realize there will be ups and downs, trials and tribulations, and victories and disappointments. The most important thing is to never give up and keep trying your best. One thing I wish someone would have shared with me prior to going to college is to learn how to allocate time for everyday mundane activities. Simple things such as eating or doing laundry can easily be forgotten in the hustle and bustle of college life and can contribute to more stress than is needed on a day-to-day basis.

Q: Have you found an opportunity to connect with other Orthodox Christian students on campus? (OCF, local parish, church friends from home who are also attending your school) If yes, how are you supporting each other in the Faith?

I have had a few discussions with the OCF branch at UGA. Near our student center, there is often a priest painting icons, which draws many students in who are curious to discuss the faith. It is a great way to remain grounded in Orthodoxy while being surrounded constantly with secular and worldly values in college. Furthermore, in my dorm hall there were actually a couple of Orthodox students who I met and became friends with. It was nice to have something that

we shared which was not superficial or shallow, but rather deep and a part of each one of us.

Q: What are your top two college experiences so far?

One of my top two college experiences so far would be being involved in a service-learning class with the City of Milledgeville to help develop their public transportation system, with a focus on remaining environmentally sustainable along with being accessible to the city's impoverished areas. Our class helped accomplish these tasks by attaining economically viable electric buses along with setting routes that were accessible to lower income communities. Along with this, my second favorite college experience was becoming back-to-back national football champions in my first two years here at UGA. The atmosphere at games along with the school spirit and enthusiasm displayed by all members of the UGA community is truly something beautiful! To be a part of the UGA family during this time has been a truly once in a lifetime experience.

Q: What would you say to high school seniors in our diocese to encourage them to apply for the DOMSE scholarship?

The DOMSE scholarship has taken a massive burden off myself and my family's shoulders in regard to our financial investment in my education. Many costs in college are often unaccounted for by high school students, from everyday sustainment to textbooks. The DOMSE Scholarship, through the generosity of our Diocese, can assist you and your family in paying for college along with hopefully bringing you closer to Christ through the attainment of knowledge and patience which college so uniquely endows upon those who embark on the journey of higher education.

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Words from Sayedna Nicholas

Dear Reverend Clergy and Faithful of DOMSE,

I am writing to you today from Lebanon with joy and with firm hope for the future of both our Diocese of Miami and the Southeast and our God-protected Archdiocese of North America.

As you know, in January I was nominated to be considered by the Holy Synod as the next Archbishop of New York and Metropolitan of all North America. Many of you vocally supported my nomination and I am humbled and grateful for all of your expressions of love and support over the past months.

Nevertheless, this nomination was a heavy burden to me for many reasons, not least being that if I was elected Metropolitan, it would change my close relationship with all of you, my spiritual children, in DOMSE.

I am grateful to God for His mercy and grace because today He has seen fit to remove this burden from me. Today the Holy Synod of the Patriarchate of Antioch has elected His Eminence Metropolitan Saba as our new Metropolitan. I thank the Holy Synod for their careful consideration of all of the candidates and for their love for our Archdiocese. In particular, I thank His Beatitude Patriarch JOHN X for his leadership and for all of the kindness and hospitality that he has extended to me throughout this process.

The details of Metropolitan Saba's enthronement will be announced at a later date.

I am very excited at the selection of Metropolitan Saba! I have known His Eminence for many years. He is a holy, prayerful bishop, a true living icon of our Lord Jesus Christ, and an able administrator. He brings a wealth of experience to our Archdiocese, and I sincerely look forward to assisting him as he shepherds us on our path to salvation. I call on each of you to do the same.

I know that some of you may be tempted to be disappointed with the outcome of this process, but I urge you to put aside any feelings of resentment or division. Such feelings come only from the adversary of our souls. Our ultimate goal in everything that we do is to serve the Lord and His Holy Church, and not to seek personal gain or glory. We must now come together as one body in Christ and fully support our Metropolitan Saba and his ministry to our Archdiocese. I am confident that he is the right person for this important job and that, with God's help, he will lead us with wisdom, compassion, and faith.

+May the Lord God grant His Eminence many years of fruitful ministry in this vineyard of North America!

Please join me in praying every single day for the success of our new Metropolitan and for the protection and vitality of our Archdiocese.

Theology Editor's Corner

During Great Lent, the Orthodox Church calls each one of us to increase our efforts when it comes to prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. And while the labors of Lent can be daunting for many of us, one of the keys of the entire Lenten season is that none of us are struggling alone. Indeed, one of the sweetest things about Lent is how it reminds us that we are the Body of Christ, making the yearly pilgrimage to the Crucifixion and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus all together, side by side, every step of the way.

Great Lent begins just after Forgiveness Sunday, and this is fitting, since forgiving one another allows us to enter the Fast as one united church community. St. John Chrysostom says that nothing makes us more like God than "our readiness to forgive the wicked and the wrongdoer." For, "love is the root of all that is good" and God "brings us together and cements us to each other" "by removing from all quarters whatever mars" love - including every grievance, resentment, or offense, Indeed. forgiving one another even unites us to God, since there is no one, "not a single one, whether father or mother or friend, who loves us as much as the God who created us."

Forgiveness Sunday cements us to one another and to God, but this process continues throughout Lent. For instance, in many places in the U.S., Pan-Orthodox Vespers services are held on the first Sunday of Lent – the Sunday of Orthodoxy – and perhaps for the rest of the Sunday evenings throughout Lent as well. At these services the local Orthodox churches from all the jurisdictions host one another for a time of prayer and fellowship each week. and this is a great encouragement, since attending them allows us to experience for ourselves that our individual parishes are not isolated islands, but are part of the city-wide, nation-wide, and worldwide family of churches that is the Holy Orthodox Church. In addition, many of our parishes host Lenten potlucks after the Pre-Sanctified Liturgy on Wednesday evenings, and here we experience not only that our Lord Jesus waits for us in the guiet stillness of the church temple to bless us and strengthen us with His own body and blood, but also that our brothers and sisters in Christ hold us up - feeding us, sharing Lenten recipes, enjoying our company, and inviting us into all of the joy of the Kingdom of God.

In the Orthodox Church we take up a common fast from meat, dairy, fish, wine, and oil rather than choosing for

ourselves what we are going to give up, because Lent is about finding our place in the Body of Christ rather than taking yet another opportunity to exercise our own will. The common struggle of the season allows us to experience ourselves as the united Body of Christ and to receive our Lord Jesus' strength and joy. May God cement all of us to one another this Lenten season, especially as we welcome our new Metropolitan, His Eminence Met. SABA! May God grant him many years as our chief shepherd!
